Overview

Municipality Partnership

Recruitment of learners

Learners will be recruited from the local municipalities primarily from their youth desk database as well as from NYDA (National Youth Development Agency). The college database will also be used.

Selection of learners.

Before the learners are placed into the programme they will be screened for suitability to the projects. The criteria used will be prescribed by the unit standards.
