


BE A POSITIVE MESSENGER! HOMEWORK CHALLENGE: REFUGEES AND MIGRANTS

TASK YOUR CLASS TO CARRY
OUT THE 20 CHALLENGES.

To help get things started, you could begin by discussing the cultural make up of your class, school and local area with your pupils. Were your pupils born in the local area? Were their parents or grandparents born there? If not, why did they move and how did they travel? Find the places that your pupils and their families have links to on a map or globe and make a classroom display to show this.

Migrants and their descendants have made and continue to make enormous contributions to their new homelands. To complement this activity, show your pupils the banner designed by Pen Mendonca.
