



A cultural scholar, researcher, writer, academic and public intellectual, Caroline Mose holds a Master of Science from Oxford University and a Doctor of Philosophy from the University of London's School of Oriental and African Studies. Her publications include a chapter in the ground-breaking Native Tongues: The African Hiphop Reader, alongside other publications in various journals, books and newspapers. She is an avid researcher, and has most recently published, in 2024, on the Kenyan GenZ protests and online communities.

Alongside, Caroline is also part of the Editorial Board of Jahazi Journal of Arts, Culture and Performance since 2020. She is a governance and cultural studies expert, giving her views on various media on the intersections between politics, gender, and culture. She has published various articles in leading regional newspapers, including The Nation and The Elephant. She is also a creative writer, having contributed a chapter to the anthology Nairobi Noir in 2020, and published short stories of the speculative genre in Lolwe as well as Unstamatic Magazine, both in 2022. Her short story Jaba, published in Lolwe, was shortlisted for the Caine Prize 2023. She is currently querying for her first novel, an excavation of what she calls Old Afrika in the speculative fiction genre.

She has worked as a market researcher across seven African countries, a faculty member at a Kenyan University, and a programme director for a non-profit supporting African women researchers; and is currently transitioning back towards supporting young girls and women gain meaningful education to live meaningful lives within the wider culture.

Currently, Michael serves as the High Level Events
Programming Manager for the Royal African Society, the UK's
largest and longest-running Africa-focused charity. He is also
the Founder and Director of Creative Resilience International
(CRI), a highly regarded social enterprise specializing in
concept development and production that empowers creatives
from Black and underrepresented communities.

Michael's affiliations extend to the Mayor of London's Africa in London Committee and as a Trustee for Sustainable Impact Makers International in New York City. A certified coach and mentor, he has launched programmes for institutions including Africa Fashion Week London and the University of Northampton. He is the creative advisor for international fashion icon ALPHADI and Creative Director for the African Fashion Awards.

His recent accomplishments include being a Senior Producer for International Africa Day celebrations with UNESCO and WIPO, a consultant for the V&A's "Africa Fashion" exhibition, and curating the Royal African Society's 120th Anniversary Gala. He also co-produced Grace Jones' Meltdown Festival.

Most recently, Michael co-founded Dhaa Botswana, a platform in partnership with the Botswana government to boost the country's creative industries. Michael's core passion is to empower others.

Dr. Komolo is a practising lawyer and academic/researcher based out of Nairobi, Kenya, and the Official Ombudsperson for Amnesty International, Kenya Chapter (2024-27).

He is also a Member of Tax Appeals Tribunal, where he adjudicates cases on tax law and administration; and Chairs the Tribunal's Committee on Trainings, Capacity Building & Resource Mobilisation & Senior Lecturer, Faculty of Law, Egerton University. He also serves as Visiting Lecturer at Strathmore Law School, where he designed and taught the first LL.M Unit on Public Private Partnerships (in Africa) (PPP) in Kenya. He also supervised over 12 LL.M theses in the areas of PPP, Human Rights, Environmental Law, Law of the Sea, International Trade Law, and Natural Resources amongst other fields. He is the immediate former Principal Lecturer at the Kenya School of Law, where he designed and taught CPD courses on PPP,

Intellectual Property; Human Rights, Public Policy and Legislative Drafting, Dispute Resolution, Devolution and Public Finance amongst others. He served as the Editor-in-Chief, African Journal of Comparative Constitutional Law (AJCCL) (2020-22).

He is a Member of the Global Young Academy (GYA) and Africa Science Leadership Fellow, University of Pretoria, South Africa. He has also been a Visiting Fellow, Faculty of Law, KU Leuven, Belgium (2020/21); Resident Fellow, Harvard Law School, USA (2018/19); Doctoral Fellow, World Trade Organisation, Geneva, Switzerland (2014); Swire Scholar, University of Hong Kong, China, (2011-15); and Commonwealth Scholar, University of Kent, UK (2009/10).

He holds Postdoc in Laws (Harvard Law School), PhD in Laws (University of Hong Kong), Master of Laws (University of Kent, UK) and LL.B (Moi University Kenya)

Mr Ngandeu Ngatta Hugue holds a Postgraduate degree in human rights and humanitarian laws, including specialized Certificates in gender-based violence prevention and redress mechanisms, human rights and humanitarian action.

He started his professional career in 2003 in Cameroon, where he occupied different functions and capacities in as various fields as social inclusion, human rights protection and humanitarian interventions.

He joined UNESCO in December 2007, as Associate Expert at the Organization's Headquarters in Paris, supporting programmes related to Culture of Peace, the Slave Route, the General History of Africa, Intercultural dialogue, among others.

From December 2016, he moved to the Field Offices network as Programme Specialist for Social and Human Sciences at the UNESCO Regional Office for Western Africa based in Abuja, Nigeria, and since May 2020, he occupies the function of Unit Head and Programme Specialist for Social and Human Sciences at the UNESCO Regional Office for Eastern Africa in Nairobi, Kenya, coordinating a regional portfolio for 13 countries on as various workstreams as disability inclusion, gender equality, fight against discrimination, human rights and intercultural dialogue, academic freedom and safety of scientists, meaningful youth engagement, and sports for development and peace.

He also spearheads the deployment in the region of the UNESCO's Programme on Bioethics and Ethics of Science and Technology, under which he oversees the implementation of the UNESCO Recommendation on the Ethics of Artificial Intelligence, with the piloting of the Readiness Assessment Methodology in countries such as Comoros, Kenya, Ethiopia, Mauritius, Rwanda, Tanzania Somalia and Uganda.

Mr Ngandeu is a true believer of UNESCO's mandate and commitment to build peace in the minds of women and men through education, the sciences, culture and communication and information.



Dr. Njabulo Chipangura

Assistant Professor Department of Anthropology, National University of Ireland (UK)

Dr. Njabulo Chipangura is based at the National University of Ireland, Maynooth where he is an Assistant Professor of African Anthropology with a special interest in museum anthropology. He was appointed to this role in February 2025 and until recently was the Curator of Anthropology/Living Cultures at Manchester Museum, University of Manchester (2022-2025). He graduated with a Ph.D in Anthropology from the University of the Witwatersrand, Johannesburg, South Affrica in 2020.

He is interested in looking at the empirical ways by which museum practices can be decolonised by undoing earlier ways of knowledge production particularly African collections and their representations in ethnographic museum in the Global North. Previously he worked for the National Museums and Monuments of Zimbabwe as Curator of Archaeology for 11 years (2009 -2020) and was based at Mutare Museum, Eastern Zimbabwe. He has published several research papers that look at ongoing debates around the coloniality of museums and associated knowledge production and representation practices, to imagine a decolonised museum in Africa.

Some of his selected publications have appeared in high impact factor journals such as: African Arts (MIT Press), Museum Worlds (Berghahn), Museum Anthropology (Wiley), Museum International (Taylor and Francis), Curator: The Museum Journal (Wiley), Museum Management & Curatorship (Taylor and Francis) and Museums and Social Issues (Taylor and Francis). His first book entitled Museums as Agents for Social Change: Collaborative Programmes at the Mutare Museum was published by Routledge in 2021.

He has a forthcoming book (co -written) which is going to be published by Cambridge University Press (CUP) later this year called Race, Genetics, History: new practices, new approaches. In addition he is currently working on a co-edited volume entitled The Museologies of Africa: Rethinking African Museums, Community Inclusion, Living Cultures and Decolonisation which will be published by Routledge in 2026. He sit on the editorial board of Museum International a widely read journal on museum practices and theory which is published by Routledge in collaboration with the International Council of Museums (ICOM) and is also a managing editor on Museums and Society published by University of Leicester Open Journals.

Jim Joel is a Ugandan artist, researcher, and founder of Page 4, an ongoing archival and artistic research project exploring cinematic and architectural histories in East Africa. Beginning with Kampala's defunct cinemas, Page 4 examines how film spaces—many built in the 1960s by British and Indian communities—shaped civic life and influenced urban form. The project is expanding across the region.

Jim's interdisciplinary work bridges photography, walking methodologies, oral histories, music, and both personal and institutional archives to interrogate colonial-structured records and activate the city as a living, participatory archive. He curates a growing collection of photographs documenting former cinema spaces and the films they showcased, drawn from institutional collections.

His public walks function as tools of historical inquiry, civic engagement, and co-curation. These are supported by digital platforms—especially Instagram and a website—that serve as annotation tools and open-access exhibition spaces. Through hashtags, collaborations, and audiovisual content, Jim uses social media to reach broader publics and invite collective authorship of memory.

Recent interventions include Chai and Cinema (2025), held at Emin Pasha during the Uganda Museum Fair, exploring tea culture and cinemas as political and cultural spaces. His work has been exhibited and presented in Uganda (KLA Art Festival, 2024 & 2021; Uganda Museum, 2023), South Africa (Kampala Road Unveiled, 2024), the UK (Akalimu, 2022), Germany (Streetware X Mivumba, 2021), and Rwanda (Kigali Photo Festival, 2019). He has co-authored photobooks with the Cross-Cultural Foundation of Uganda and CiviSource, and contributed to The Walrus magazine in Canada.

The centre serves as a living classroom: hosting researchers from Kenyan and international universities, ornithologists, school groups, conferences, and even film crews

Am originally a teacher by training and left high school teaching after 10 years and joined the INGO world taking an early retirement in 2024 to focus on my Cultural Heritage Dream.

My museum houses a rich collection of tangible and intangible heritage: Kamba drums, honey storage gourds, traditional utensils, arrow poison, snuff holders, and wooden record-keeping boards (ika), among many others.

I have a collection of over 5000 items of cultural significance.

National Gallery of Zimbabwe Executive Director's Profile – Raphael Chikukwa. Born in Zimbabwe and worked mainly as an independent curator for the past ten years before joining the National Gallery of Zimbabwe mid 2010 as its Chief Curator of Contemporary Art and also its Deputy Director. Now just been promoted as the Executive Director of the National gallery of Zimbabwe. Chikukwa is the founding Curator of the Zimbabwe Pavilion curator at the 54th Venice Biennale 2011 and just curated After Shock: Re Imagining life after Cyclone Idai 2020. He seats on so many jury committees that include

High Line Plinth in New York 2020, DAAD in Germany, Delfina Foundation London UK, Pinchuk Art Prize, and was a jury member for the Dakar Biennale 2018.

He also curated other edition of the Zimbabwe Pavilion from 2013, 2015, 2017, the current 2019 Zimbabwe Pavilion at the 58th La Biennale di Venezia 2019. Chikukwa was a panel for the Art Basel Hong Kong 2019 and also a jury member for the Dakar Biennale 2018 in Senegal. He has also contributed in a number of Publications that includes, a newly published African Art Reframed: Reflections and Dialogue on Museum Culture by University of Illinois Press USA, Mowonero: Insights in Zimbabwean Contemporary Art, Zimbabwe Pavilion Catalogues (Seeing Ourselves 2011, Dudziro 2013, Pixels of Ubuntu/Unhu 2015, Deconstructing Boundaries 2017 and Soko Risina Musoro – A Tale Without a Head 2019) Kaboo Ka Muwala: Migration and Mobility Exhibition 2016 etc. His qualifications and international experience earned this position at the national institution, which he hopes to change the visual arts landscape of Zimbabwe.

Chikukwa was awarded the 2006 - 2007 Chevening Scholar now holds an MA Curating Contemporary Design from Kingston University London. The 2nd Johannesburg Biennale in 1997 provided an impetus to Raphael's curatorial career after working as a volunteer guide for the Biennale. He later moved to his home country Zimbabwe as a process of relocation to his motherland. Recently he was among seven Curators from Africa attending the Tate Modern Symposium "Curating Africa where he presented a paper on his curatorial practice.
