Recommendation

We recommend continued accreditation. The next inspection falls due in 2022; there are no grounds for bringing this forward.

Changes to the summary statement

No changes need to be made to the summary statement, apart from adding the date of this inspection.

New summary statement

The British Council inspected and accredited MCSE in August 2018 and in July 2019. The Accreditation Scheme assesses the standards of management, resources and premises, teaching, welfare, and safeguarding under 18s and accredits organisations which meet the overall standard in each area inspected (see www.britishcouncil.org/education/accreditation for details).

This private language school offers courses in general and professional English for adults (18+) and young people (16+) and vacation courses for under 18s.

Strengths were noted in the areas of student administration, premises and facilities, learning resources, academic management, teaching, and care of students.

The inspection report stated that the organisation met the standards of the Scheme.

New summary inspection findings

Management

The provision meets the section standard and exceeds it in some respects. The school operates effectively and responsibly in accordance with its publicity and to the benefit of its students. Systems work efficiently and there is a sound allocation of administrative resources. There is evidence of a genuine concern for quality, and of steady and continuing improvement. However, publicity understated the maximum number of students per class in the junior vacation course. *Student administration* is an area of strength.

Introduction

Background

After the 2018 full inspection, accreditation was continued with a recommendation for a spot check to inspect the junior vacation course held at University of Salford.

Preparation

The school was contacted in advance to check the dates of the junior vacation course and the availability of key personnel.

Programme and persons present

The inspector arrived at 08.45 on day four of the first week of the course, held meetings with the centre manager, the academic manager and the activity manager, visited the residential accommodation and had lunch with students and staff before leaving at 13.30.

Findings

Management

Recruiting staff for the course, and retaining those recruited, had proved difficult. As a consequence, the centre manager was the main school's head of administration, the academic manager was the main school's director of studies and the number of teachers was two below what was required. This led to the maximum number of students in each class exceeding that given in the publicity. Two new teachers were due to arrive the following week.

Premises and resources

The course is held on the University of Salford campus. This comprises a number of modern buildings located in extensive parklands. Classrooms are of a good size and are quiet, flexibly furnished and well equipped. They are clean and well decorated. There is a large room for staff to use. There are sufficient learning resources.

Teaching and learning

All the teachers have a Level six qualification and are TEFLI. The academic manager is TEFLQ and very experienced. The course structure is based on core textbooks that are suitable for the age group, supplemented with materials provided by the school or by teachers themselves. There was very comprehensive support available to the teachers both in person from the academic manager and online in terms of lesson plans and core and supplementary materials.

Welfare and student services

The students are housed in a secure modern on-campus residence in 'flats' of between six and eight ensuite rooms that share good-sized common kitchen/social areas.

Comments

At the time of the inspection there were 128 students between the ages of 10 and 17 enrolled on the Salford summer vacation course.

S4 Arrangements in this area are generally satisfactory but no reference had been obtained for one teacher returning after a period of more than three months.

Action taken on points to be addressed

Welfare and student services

W14 More could be done to get a better return on written early-bird and end-of-course evaluation of all types of accommodation.

Addressed for the vacation course. A feedback questionnaire had been prepared for circulation at the end of the week.

Safeguarding under 18s

S3 The school's parental consent form does not clearly separate information for the parent to read and understand from items for which the parent's consent is needed.

Addressed. The consent form has been redesigned and is now satisfactory.

Conclusions

The junior vacation course being run on the University of Salford campus was being effectively managed and operated, albeit with two senior managers from the main school filling the centre and academic management roles. The premises, including the residential accommodation for the students, are modern, in very good condition and secure. They provide an excellent venue for a course of this type.
