Please describe the activity that took place. If you worked with a partner school, describe how you worked together. What were the aims of this activity? (250 Words)	As a whole school we celebrated World Diversity Awareness Day in collaboration with our partner school in Germany. Each class selected a country or language connected to their pupils' backgrounds, including Ukraine, Poland, Spain, Turkey, Latvia and Lithuania. Pupils, parents, and community members were actively involved in sharing languages, food, customs and traditions, which created a rich and inclusive atmosphere across the school. A key feature of the day was a virtual exchange between our Year 3 pupils and a Grade 2 class in Germany. During this session, our pupils listened to traditional German fairy tales read by their peers abroad and, in turn, performed a German song that they had learnt with the support of a parent. This direct interaction enabled pupils to use languages in an authentic context and deepened their understanding of cultural exchange. The activity had several aims: to celebrate the cultures and languages represented within our own school community; to increase pupils' knowledge and appreciation of the wider world; to promote belonging and diversity awareness; and to encourage cross-cultural dialogue and empathy. The outcomes were clear and impactful. The
	profile of seven home languages already



	spoken by pupils was raised, giving children pride in their identities while also stimulating curiosity about others. Community engagement was strengthened through the involvement of parents and local partners. Our international partnership was consolidated through the live-stream exchange, which gave pupils a memorable experience of connecting with peers overseas. Overall, the day promoted curiosity, inclusion and pride in cultural diversity.

The letters were hand-delivered during a teacher visit, alongside school artefacts such as a canvas of our logo and photographs, to give pupils abroad a tangible sense of our school community. In return, the German class wrote back, beginning an ongoing exchange of ideas and experiences. The exchange extended beyond letter writing. Pupils compared similarities and differences between UK and German education systems, sparking discussions about school life, subjects and extracurricular activities. Our German partner school is recognised for its strong environmental ethos, which inspired us to begin developing our own Climate Action Plan. We formed an Eco-Committee and are preparing to link with the German school's committee to share ideas and good practice in sustainability. The aims of this activity were to build a culture of belonging and partnership, give pupils opportunities to communicate across languages, raise awareness of cultural similarities and differences, and foster curiosity about another country. The outcomes were meaningful and wideranging. Pupils showed pride in their writing and enthusiasm about receiving authentic replies from peers abroad. They became more aware of cultural and educational differences while recognising commonalities. Staff benefitted from professional exchange, particularly around sustainability, and the partnership has become a platform for long-term collaboration and shared learning.

	A distinctive feature of the programme was its
	responsive nature. Teachers adapted lessons
	to reflect pupils' experiences and
	backgrounds. For example, when new pupils
	joined us from The Gambia, teachers
	incorporated Gambian currency into maths
	lessons and studied their home village in
	Geography. Similarly, in Year 1's "People and
	Places" unit, pupils learned about continents by following the migration routes of swallows,
	linking the UK to countries such as Poland,
	Spain, Greece and Nigeria. These links were

	enriched further by exploring pupils' own family connections to other parts of the world. The aims were to raise pupils' awareness of major global issues, promote cultural diversity
	and interconnectedness, and encourage empathy, responsibility and a sense of belonging to a global community. The outcomes were significant. Pupils developed a deeper understanding of sustainability and migration, becoming more curious about global challenges and their role in addressing them. They learned to appreciate both cultural differences and common human experiences. Teachers reported increased engagement when lessons linked directly to pupils' lives, and pupils
	themselves expressed pride in seeing their cultures reflected in class. The curriculum successfully broadened horizons and laid the foundation for long-term global learning.

(250 Words)	These activities have strengthened pupils' sense of belonging, raised the profile of languages and cultures within the school, and created pride in pupils' heritage. They have increased empathy, tolerance, and curiosity. Staff have developed stronger links with international colleagues, sharing ideas on pedagogy and sustainability. The wider community has also been engaged, with parents and community members actively involved in events. Overall, the school has taken significant steps towards embedding an international outlook in its ethos and curriculum.
